## **Minutes of the Regular Farmington City Council Meeting September 12, 2022**

The regular meeting of the Farmington City Council scheduled for Monday, September 12th, 2022 was called to order at 6:00 pm by Mayor Ernie Penn. City Clerk Kelly Penn called the roll and the following Council Members answered to their names: Sherry Mathews, Hunter Carnahan, Keith Lipford, Linda Bell, Brenda Cunningham, Diane Bryant and Shelly Parsley. Also present was City Attorney Tennant and City Business Manager McCarville. Council Member Morgan was absent.

### **Comments from Citizens**

Mayor Penn asked if there was anyone who wished to comment at this time. Planning Commissioner Judy Horne addressed the council and provided them with pictures of a residence at the corner of Southwinds Road & Applewood that has been impacted by a long ongoing road construction issue. The homeowner, who was not present, had received poor quality sod. She said he can't get anyone to help him and to add insult, code enforcement issued him a warning that he would receive a ticket if he didn't mow his yard. She wanted the council to take action and vote to change or require an ordinance to monitor third party vendor quality of sod. City Attorney Tennant advised her that isn't done. She also advised that the planning commission is working on multifamily design standings and larger setbacks.

### **Approval of the minutes for the August 8th, 2022 Regular Meeting.**

On the motion of Council Member Bryant, a second by Council Member Parsley and by the consent of all Council Members present after a roll call vote, the minutes were approved as presented by a vote of 7-0.

### **Financial Reports.**

Mayor Penn presented the financial reports to the City Council.

### **Entertain a motion to read all Ordinances and Resolutions by title only.**

On the motion of Council Member Bryant and a second by Council Member Lipford and by the consent of all Council Members present after a roll call vote, the motion to read all Ordinances and Resolutions by title only was approved 7-0.

### **Proclamations, Special Announcements, Committee/Commission Appointments, Committee Reports**

Mayor Penn advised the Council that the city had been approved for a \$500,000 TAP grant, which is an 80/20 grant for the trails project.

Police Chief Hubbard introduced new police officer Tyler Standifer.

### **Committee Reports.**

Street Committee – No meeting was held. Mayor Penn advised that the county and ARDOT are paving Bethel Blacktop to Viney Grove Road. The city has 3/10ths of a mile from the starting point to our city limits and we have been given an opportunity to piggyback on the project and get our 3/10ths of a mile portion paved. The project has already been engineered and ARDOT will add a change order to include a revised starting point. The city of Farmington's cost will be a maximum of \$60,000. On the motion of Council Member Bryant and a second by Council Member Cunningham and by the consent of all Council Members present after a roll call vote, the motion to approve entering into the project at a maximum cost of the project not to exceed \$60,000.00 was approved 7-0.

Parks & Recreation Committee – No meeting was held

Community Development Committee – No meeting was held.

**Items to be removed from City of Farmington Inventory – Fire Department**

Chief Hellard provided a memo in the packet to the council that the 2014 Chevrolet Tahoe being requested for removal is being sold to the Wedington Fire Department for \$16,0000. The funds from that sale will be used to offset the purchase price of the new Dodge Ram 1500 Pickup Truck. Chief Hellard advised the council the Fire Department has been approved for an AFG Grant that will help purchase a new air compressor for the new air packs. On the motion of Council Member Carnahan and a second by Council Member Lipford and by the consent of all Council Members present after a roll call vote, the motion to remove the 2014 Chevrolet Tahoe VIN number 1GNSK2E04ER205001 from the Fire Department inventory as of September 30, 2022 was approved 7-0.

**Ordinance No. 2022-15 An Ordinance levying a tax on the real and personal property within the City of Farmington, Arkansas, for the year 2023 fixing the rate thereof at 5.0 mils and certifying the same to the County Clerk of Washington County, Arkansas.**

Mayor Penn called for public comment, there was none. Council Member Bryant made a motion to suspend the rule requiring the reading of an ordinance in full on three different dates be suspended and for Ordinance 2022-15 be read one time by title only, it was seconded by Council Member Carnahan and after a roll call vote, the motion was approved 7-0. City Attorney Tennant read Ordinance 2022-15 by title only. Mayor Penn asked Shall the ordinance pass? After a roll call vote, the motion passed 7-0. A motion to pass Ordinance 2022-15 with an Emergency Clause was made by Council Member Bryant and seconded by Council Member Lipford, after a roll call vote the motion passed 7-0.

There being no further business to come before the council and on the motion of Council Member Lipford and seconded by Council Member Parsley and by the consent of all members present, the meeting adjourned at 6:21 pm until the next regularly scheduled meeting to be held Monday, October 10th, 2022 in the City Council Chambers at City Hall, located at 354 West Main Street, Farmington, Arkansas.

**Recommendation:**

We are requesting the addition of Lieutenant to the Departmental organization structure. One Lieutenant per shift (3) will be promoted.

**Background:**

With the addition of 3 full time firefighters and the potential for future growth of the department, the department needs to continue to develop leadership roles within the department. This role will allow more flexibility in our operations and maintain command presence at all emergency operations. These personnel will be able to supervise daily operations of the department in the absence of a Captain. The requirements to obtain these positions will include completion of the driver operator manual, IFSAC Driver Operator certification, Officer 1, and 2 years full time firefighting experience.

**Budget Impact:**

\$13,800

All current Captains will move one grade to allow for the creation of this position. Three personnel will move one grade to fill the position.

## **Lieutenant**

### **Definition:**

Under the general supervision of the Captain and Fire Chief, to perform supervisory and technical work in routine and emergency operations of the Fire Department; to supervise, coordinate and inspect equipment as assigned; to operate in a supervisory capacity in the absence of the Captain; to perform related work as required.

### **Typical Duties:**

Be proficient in the operation of emergency vehicles; Operate emergency vehicles in a safe manner; train others in the operation of fire apparatus; ensure vehicles and equipment are inspected and maintained; respond to emergencies as a commanding officer and assume responsibility for the supervision, performance and safety of assigned firefighting personnel; ensure required staffing of apparatus; direct incident operations until relieved by a superior officer, supervise and assist in firefighting, hazardous materials response and rescue situations; supervise and assist in administering emergency medical service and basic life support at the scene of an emergency; make reports and maintain records of incidents; supervise and participate in the inspection of buildings and installations for fire hazards and fire safety systems as required by State laws and City ordinances; Operate in the capacity of a Captain when needed.

### **Tools and Equipment Used:**

Various fire apparatus, fire pumps, hoses, and other firefighting, hazardous materials response and rescue equipment, ladders, personal protective equipment, emergency medical equipment, radio, pager, personal computer, phone. Physical Demands: While performing the duties of this job, the employee is frequently required to sit and talk and hear. The employee is occasionally required to walk; use hands to finger, handle, or feel objects, tools, or controls; and reach with hands and arms. The employee is occasionally required to climb or balance; stoop, kneel, crouch, or crawl on uneven surfaces and/or in confined spaces; and taste or smell. The employee must frequently lift and/or move up to 25 pounds and occasionally lift and/or move up to 175 pounds or more with assistance. Specific vision abilities required by this job include close vision, distance vision, peripheral vision, depth perception, and the ability to adjust focus.

### **Work Environment:**

Work is performed primarily in office, vehicles, and outdoor settings, in all weather conditions ranging from below freezing to in excess of 100 degrees of Fahrenheit, including temperature extremes, during day and night shifts. Work is often performed in emergency and stressful situations. Individual is exposed to hearing alarms and hazards associated with fighting fires and rendering emergency medical assistance, including smoke, noxious odors, fumes, chemicals, liquid chemicals, solvents, and oils. The employee occasionally works near moving mechanical parts and in high, precarious places and is occasionally exposed to wet and/or humid conditions, fumes or airborne particles, toxic or caustic chemicals, risk of electrical shock, and vibration. The noise level in the work environment is usually quiet in office settings and loud at an emergency scene.

### **Desired Qualifications:**

2 years as a full time firefighter; Completion of Farmington Fire Department Driver Manual; Officer 1 Certification; IFSAC Driver Operator Certification

Knowledge of:

Principles, practices and procedures of modern firefighting, rescue, hazardous materials rescue, fire investigation, and fire prevention; rules and regulations of the City of Farmington; operation and maintenance of firefighting apparatus and equipment; geographical relationships of streets, hydrants, building and fire facilities within the City; first aid skills; principles of combustion and hydraulics; incident command systems; principles and practices of supervision, training and performance evaluation. Full time employees must hold a current certification at the emergency medical technician level.

Ability to:

Perform all the duties of a firefighter and Captain; communicate clearly and concisely, both orally and in writing; supervise and coordinate subordinates in an efficient and effective manner; operate apparatus and equipment used in modern firefighting and rescue activities; conduct thorough fact finding inspections and investigations; plan and conduct fire/rescue training and drills; establish and maintain cooperative working relationships with subordinates, superiors, other City employees and the general public; supervise, train and evaluate assigned personnel, maintain a current CPR/AED and EMT certifications.

**Recommendation:**

We are requesting approval to purchase an Artic compressor and fill station for Station 1, through Emergency Vehicle Specialists.

**Background:**

This project will be partially funded through the Assistance to Firefighters Grant. Washington County recently purchased new SCBA units for all of the County fire departments. The pressure to fill these new units is greater than our current SCBAs. Our current system is not designed to fill these units without upgrades. The new system will allow us to refill these units safely and reliably.

**Discussion:**

Several departments in the County are purchasing new compressor systems to meet the previously stated need. In order to maintain continuity among departments, we are asking to purchase the same type of system as the surrounding departments. This purchase will be made through the HGAC bid system. This eliminates the requirement for a competitive bidding process.

**Budget Impact:**

Total cost of the project will be: 48,272.73 The AFG grant will provide \$44,688.57 toward this project. The City's portion will be \$3,604.16. This cost may be incurred in the 2023 budget due to shipping and installation times.

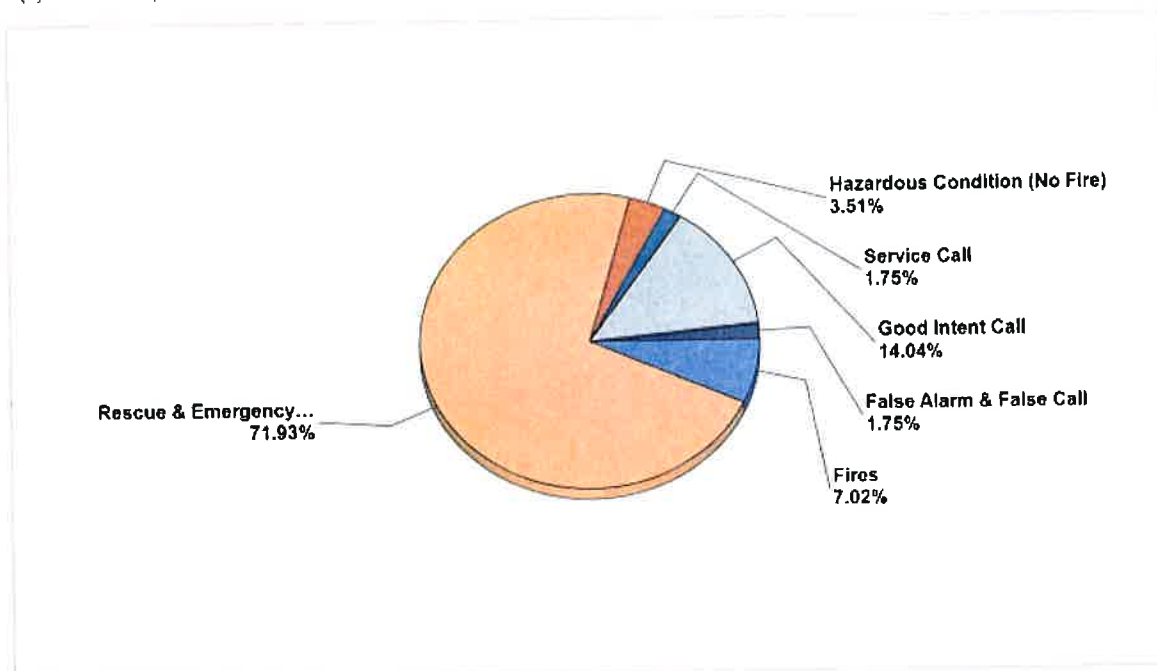

**City Employees Present:** Melissa McCarville, City Business Manager; Rick Bramall, City Building Inspector; Mayor Ernie Penn; Steve Tennant, City Attorney

**2. Approval of Minutes:** August 22, 2022 meeting minutes were approved as written.

**3. Comments from Citizens:** None.

**Public Hearings:**

**4A. Variance- Variance to hydroseed the retention area; Property located intersection of Effie Way and Hwy 170; Owner - Bart Bauer and Presented by Bart Bauer**

Bart Bauer – 8304 Apple Ridge, Little Flock, was present to discuss the request. He explained that the detention pond was very large, sod was very expensive now, and currently is hard to obtain. He also said that he has been using hydroseeding “all his life, all over” and if put on good top soil, it works fine.

Chris Brackett had submitted a memo but was not present to present it. Melissa read the memo as follows:

“The Variance Request for the Hillcrest Subdivision has been reviewed and I have the following comments.

1. Part of 5.4.2 of the Farmington Drainage Criteria states the following concerning Dry Reservoirs (Detention Ponds). “The entire reservoir area (the bottom and interior slopes to the top of the bank) shall be sodded prior to final plat approval or insurance of certificate of occupancy.”
2. The City has received several requests in the past several years for hydroseeding detention ponds. All these requests have been denied due to the requirement stated above.
3. While Hydroseeding is superior in growing grass to just seeding a site, I have found that it does not provide the soil coverage that sodding will provide. It is for this reason that I can’t support this requested variance.”

Chad Ball noted that the Commission considers “undo hardship” unique to the property when considering a variance. He didn’t believe cost was an undue hardship as per our Ordinance concerning variances. We have never granted a variance for this request in past due to the drainage criteria manual.

Further, Chad said sod is an immediate protection and will provide erosion control as well as slow runoff. The hydro seed would not prevent erosion and runoff which could then become a major issue. It can cause pollution of waterways downstream.

Keith Macedo said he was familiar with this type of work because he had done that while in college. He agreed that due to this particular situation, the previous drainage and flooding problems in Valley View Subdivision, it is important to require sod blocks.

Mr. Bauer did not know exactly what type of seed would be used in the hydroseeding, but thought Bermuda grass seed.

City Attorney Steve Tennant said that the Drainage Criteria Manual requires sod and a variance has never been granted for hydroseeding. He said to allow this variance would be opening “Pandora’s Box” in future variance requests like this..

There was no public comment on this variance.

Having no further discussion, Robert Mann called the question to approve the variance to hydroseed the retention area subject to Chris Brackett’s memo. Upon roll call, the motion failed unanimously. Sod will be required for the detention pond.

#### **Multi-Family Design Standards Ordinance**

The Commissioners informally discussed the Multi- Family Design Standards Ordinance. They determined that they will need to have another work session to discuss and make changes prior to setting a public hearing. The Multi- Family Moratorium will end in December of this year, so the ordinance changes can be completed prior to the Moratorium being lifted.

The Arkansas Legislature passed a law that severely restricts what a city can require for single-family residential housing. However, there are not restrictions regarding multi-family housing. There are a lot of things covered under the International Building Codes. The commissioners will continue to look at the standards at the next work session, rewording and making changes to multiple sections. Fences between each unit were one of the issues that will be considered at the work session. Perimeter fencing is addressed within the Landscaping Ordinance.

**Adjournment:** Having no further business, the in-person Planning Commission meeting was adjourned at 7:00 PM.

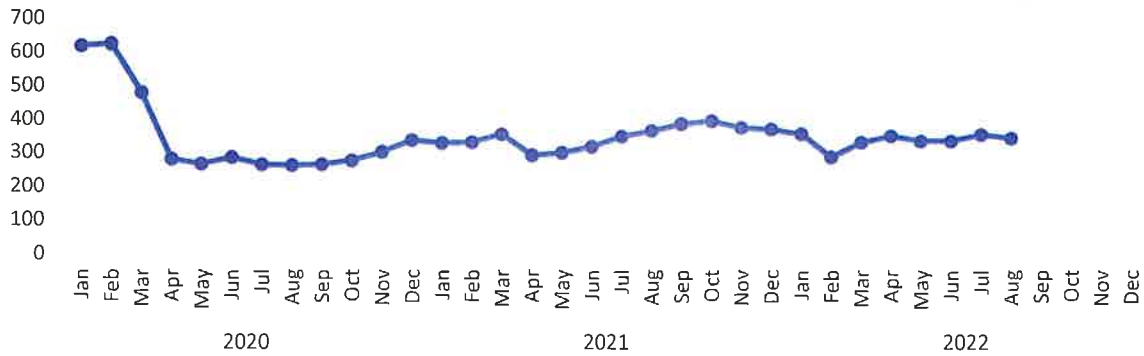

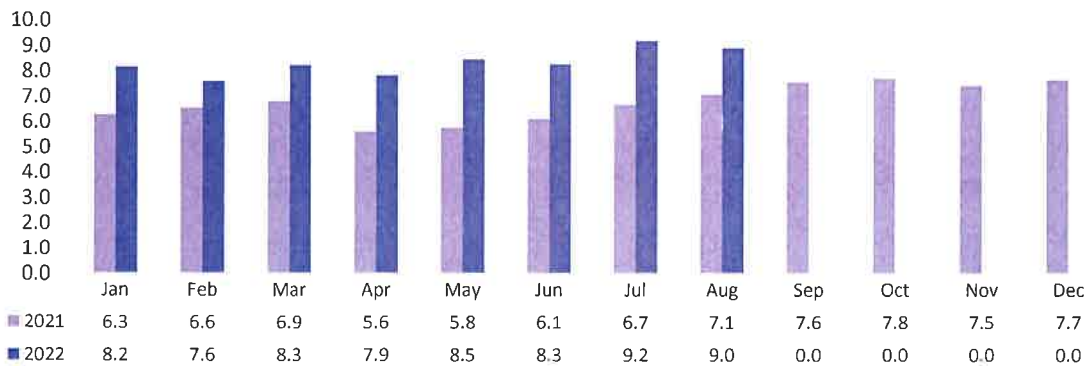
Average Daily Passengers

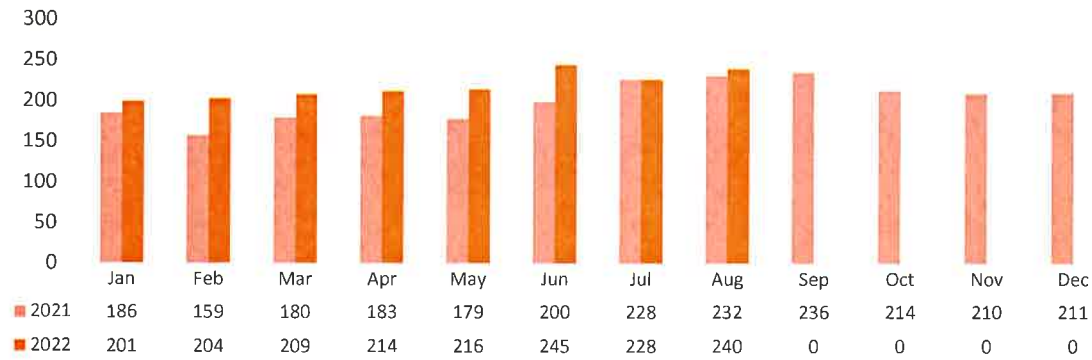

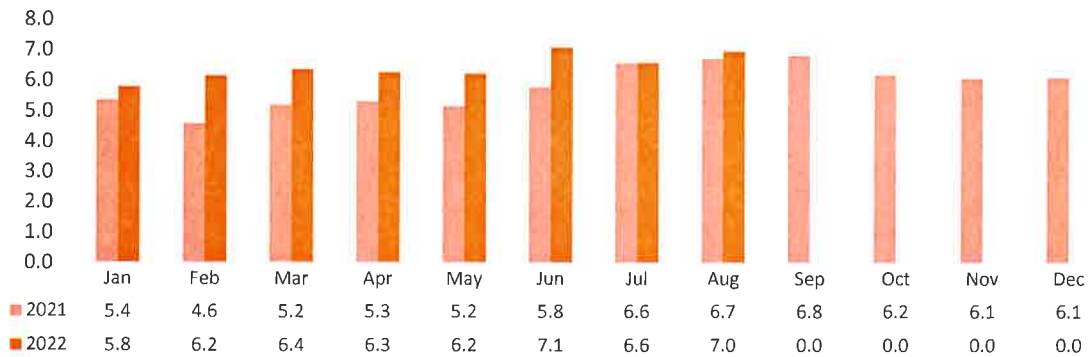
### Average Daily Passengers

### City Routes Passengers per Revenue Hour



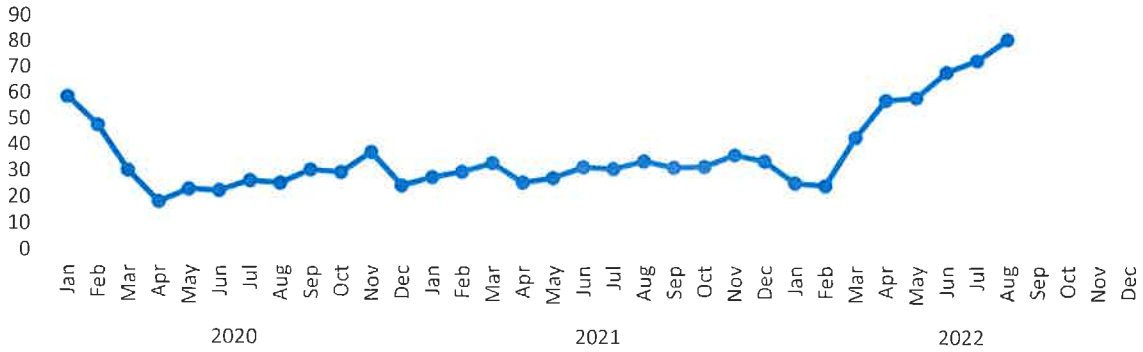

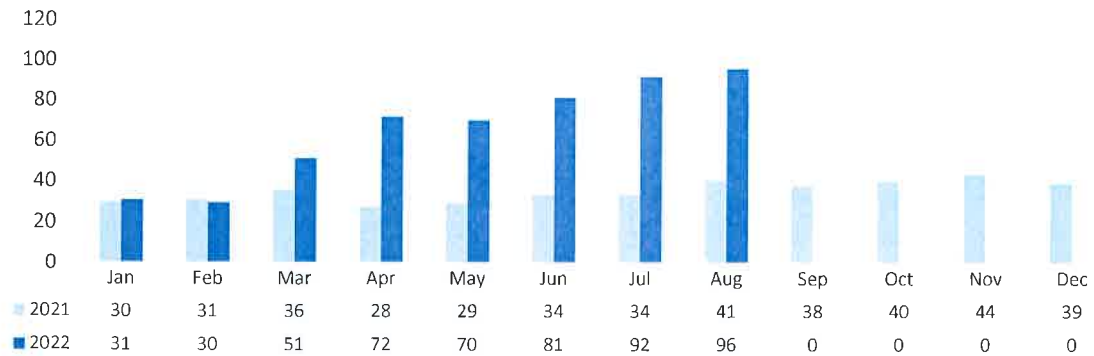

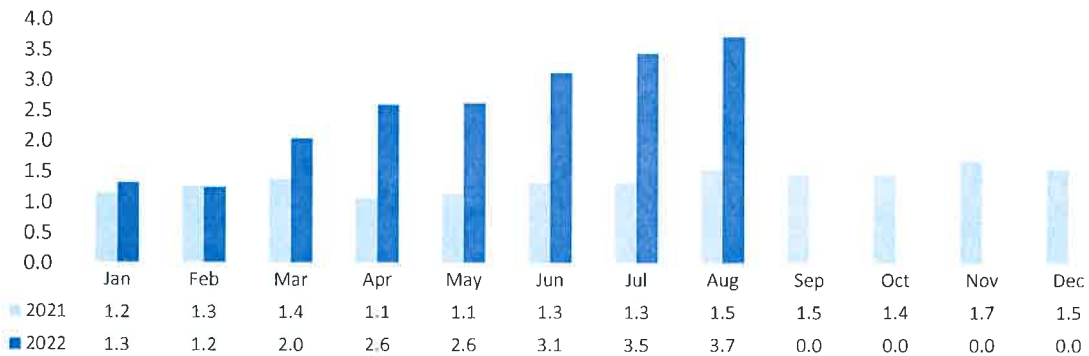
Average Daily Passengers



City Routes Daily Passengers



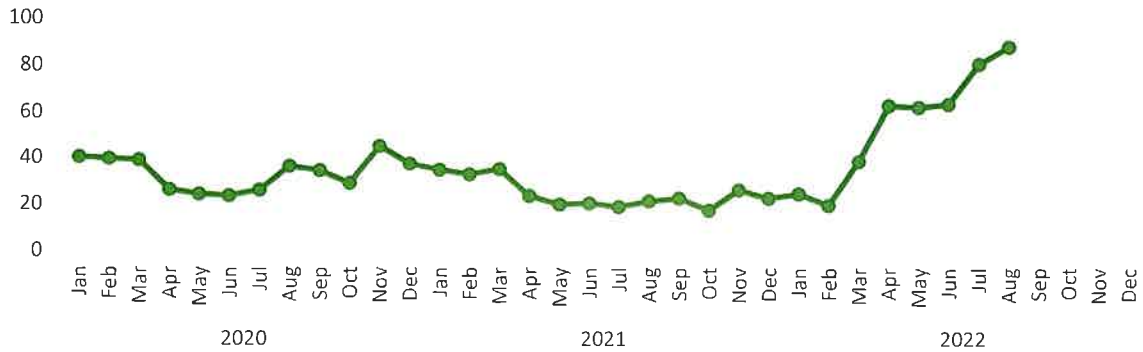
City Routes Passengers per Revenue Hour



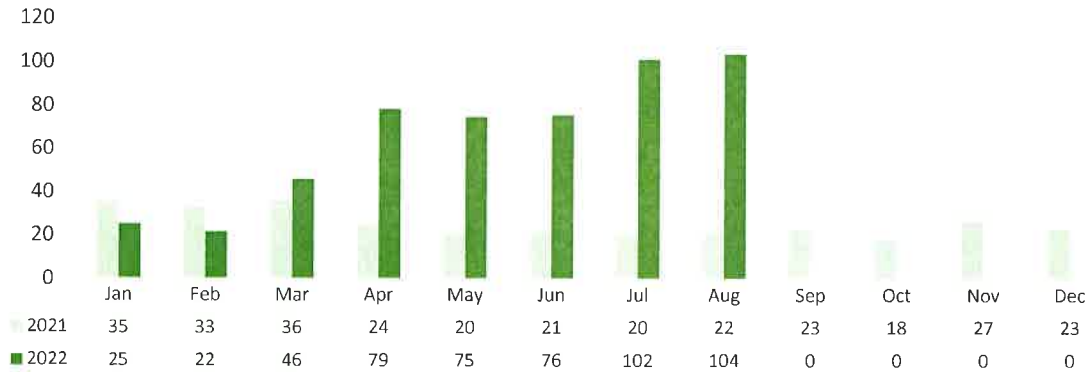

City Route Passengers per Revenue Hour

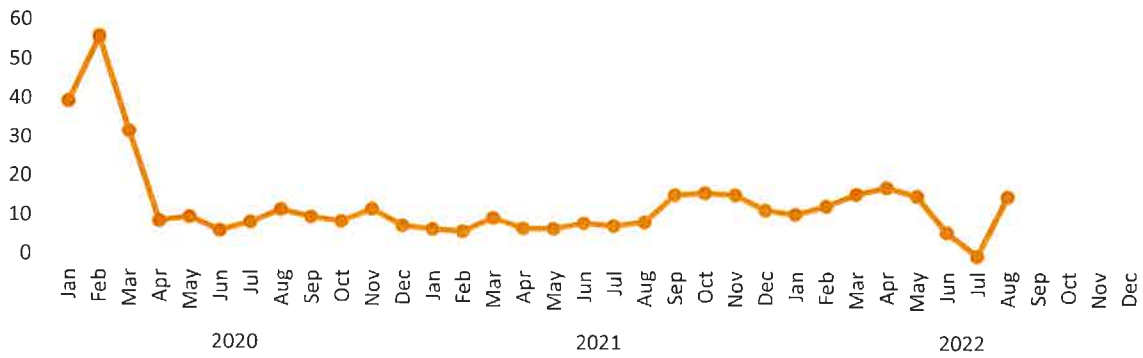
