Minutes of the Regular Farmington City Council Meeting January 9, 2017

The regular meeting of the Farmington City Council scheduled for Monday January 9th, 2017 was called to order at 6:00 pm by Mayor Ernie Penn. City Clerk Kelly Penn called the roll and the following Aldermen answered to their names: Patsy Pike, Sherry Mathews, Keith Lipford, Linda Bell, Brenda Cunningham, Bobby Morgan, Diane Bryant and Shelly Parsley. Also present were City Business Manager Melissa McCarville and City Attorney Tennant. Mayor Penn led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Comments from Citizens – moved to the end of the agenda.

Approval of the minutes for the December 12, 2016 regular meeting of the city council.

On the motion of Alderman Bryant and seconded by Alderman Lipford and by the consent of all members present, the minutes for the meeting were approved as presented.

Financial Reports – City Clerk Penn advised that city sales tax was up \$ 5,067.19 county sales tax was up \$ 146.54 for a total increase of \$6,213.73

Entertain a motion to read all Ordinances and Resolutions by title only

On the motion of Alderman Lipford and seconded by Alderman Mathews and by the consent of all members present, the motion was approved.

Proclamations, Special Announcements, Committee/Commission Appointments. Committee Reports –

Mayor Penn introduced new Court Clerk Kim Bentley to the council.

Mayor Penn announced Howard Carter will be appointed as a Planning Commissioner to fill the unexpired term of Sean Schader until February 2018. The following Planning Commissioners were also reappointed:

Robert Mann -2 year term, expiring February 2019, Matt Hutcherson -2 year term, expiring February 2019, Gerry Harris -5 year term, expiring February 2022.

On the motion of Alderman Lipford and seconded by Alderman Morgan and by the consent of all members present, the motion was approved to appoint Howard Carter as a Planning Commissioner to fill Sean Schader's term until February 2018.

On the motion of Alderman Bryant and seconded by Alderman Mathews and by the consent of all members present, the motion was approved to reappoint Robert Mann, Matt Hutcherson and Gerry Harris to terms listed above.

New Business

Semi-Annual report on Ozark Regional Public Transit

Jeff Hartley with Ozark Regional Transit gave the council a brief overview of the 2016 year. It was still a record year but ridership seems to be plateauing. Farmington bus ridership has declined by 50% and that decline is based on the number of riders to the NWACC campus. The paratransit riders have increased. Funding has been approved for the 1st quarter with the Quorum Court and they are in talks to secure funding for the rest of the year.

Request approval of contracts from Earthplan Design Alternatives, PA for MS4 Stormwater Compliance and Floodplain Administration.

City Business Manager McCarville advised that this a housekeeping item, we have worked with them since 2009. We refer all floodplain questions from citizens to them to deal with the legalities of property lines in the flood plain and any stormwater related issues. Rick Bramil is also certified now to deal with some of these issues. A motion was made by Alderman Bell and seconded by Alderman Pike to approve the motion to enter into a contract with Earthplan Design Alternatives, PA for Stormwater Compliance and Floodplain Administration, it was approved by all those present.

Request approval to purchase Traffic Controller Cabinet.

Mayor Penn advised tht the Traffic Control Cabinet at Hwy 62 and Grace Lane was hit by an uninsured motorist and we need to replace it. Alderman asked if this was insured by the city, City Business Manager McCarville said they are not but they will get a quote to see how much it would be to insure all of our existing ones, she will have the information at the next meeting.

On the motion of Alderman Cunningham and seconded by Alderman Lipford and by the consent of all members present, the motion to approve the purchase of a traffic controller cabinet in the amount of \$14,950 from Signaltek, which includes all labor and materials was approved by all present.

Discussion and comments from citizen's item – A letter was mailed to the Mayor and all Alderman that was signed by 18 residents regarding property issues at 89 North Double Springs Road and 97 North Double Springs Road. City Attorney Tennant addressed those present about each property separately.

89 North Double Springs Road — City Attorney Tennant advised that there are steps that have to be followed in the legal process and the city has attempted to notify property owner Mr. Billy McCormick by registered mail and they are unable to locate him. The notice has now been posted on his property and will remain posted there for 30 days. This has to be posted for 30 days before the city can take any steps toward demolition of the site. The item will come back to the city council after the required posting dates and they shall recommend the process needed for removal. A lien will be filed against the property and all tear down and cleanup costs will be incurred by the city. Taxes are current on the property due to the homestead exemption and there is a mortgage on the home so the lien would be secondary. We are making every attempt to locate the property owner. Attorney Tennant asked that the neighbors contact city hall if they see the property owner back on site. The ordinance will be brought to the council at the February 13th meeting and estimated costs are \$10,000.00.

97 North Double Springs Road - City Attorney Tennant advised that this property was purchased in January of 2016 and since then there have been 11 call to the police department and city hall. There are numerous health and building code violations. There are procedures that have to be followed and the property owners have to be cited 3 times in the calendar year. They have been cited 3 times and the 3rd court date is February 8th so we will have an update for the council and residents at the February meeting. We have documented the issues, have supporting photographs and we have meet with the prosecuting attorney.

There being no further business to come before the council and on the motion of Alderman Bryant and seconded by Alderman Cunningham and by the consent of all members present, the meeting adjourned at 6:48 pm until the next regularly scheduled meeting to be held Monday January 13, 2017 at 6:00 pm, in the City Council Chambers in City Hall, located at 354 West Main Street, Farmington, Arkansas.

Farmington Economic Development Committee January 26, 2017

Economic Development met on 1-26-17. Members in attendance: Tommy Cornwell, Bud Smith, Chad Bell, Melissa McCarville, Diane Bryant, Patsy Pike, Tura Graves, Mike Willard & Lynn Kutter form the newspaper.

We began the meeting with a report about the sewer system in western Farmington. We then proceed to vote on our priorities for next year.

Farmington sewer update. In May of 16 a receivership took over the management of WCPO Improvement District #5. Jerry Kopke has been working with engineers and other specialist to make the system operate effectively.

- 1. Connect the VV sewer system with PG.
- 2. Connect VV sewer with Fayetteville.
- 3. Clean up the refuse and discharge into a tributary of the ILL River.
- 4. Construct a drip irrigation system on adjacent property.
- 5. Correct the system so the lagoon could put gray water in ponds as designed.

Option 1 seems to be the most reasonable for the community. It will cost about 2 million to make that connection. Mr. Kopke is working with state and national organization to procure a loan at a reasonable rate. The Improvement districts has 3 new commissioners; William Stephenson, Kevin Lewis, & Michael Anderson. There is also a lawsuit filed on behalf of the POA of Valley View to reclaim moneys that were trusted to the former improvement district commissioners and were not used for maintaining the improvement district. Matt Lindsay is the attorney representing the case, he is from the Odom law firm. The case is on a contingency basis so there is no cost to us and the attorneys fee is 1/3 of the settlement.

Where do we want to focus our efforts next year? Let's pick 2 today with item 3 as a backup.

The committee voted to prioritize our actions next year as indicated below.

Priority 1. Sending invitations to business to encourage them to locate in Farmington.

Priority 2. Continue working on a trailhead on the Farmington side of Kessler Mountain.

Priority 3. Creating a buzzword or image about the **ZING** of Farmington.

Priority 4. We could also be a volunteer city of the year. It would require someone spending significant time to document all the volunteer hours.

Our next meeting will be February 23.

2017 State of the City Address

Citizens of Farmington, Elected Officials and City Staff, it is my honor to address you tonight and present the state of the city address.

I would like to begin by thanking the City Council, Fellow Elected officials, Planning Commissioners and all of the City Staff and Employees for your continued dedication and commitment to make Farmington a better place to live. I appreciate the work that each of our Committees have completed this last year. God has blessed our city and we should be thankful every day for these blessings.

I am pleased to report that our city is financially sound and has maintained excellent cash reserves. Our current reserve account has a \$2.8 million dollar balance and our other related City accounts have a \$1.1 million dollar balance. Sales tax was up a total of \$86,298 from City and County sales tax in 2016. Our goal is to continue to budget conservatively with our income projections and to control expenses each fiscal year. We also reduced our sewer sales tax bond debt by \$675,000 in 2016. We are planning on funding some capital improvement projects in 2017 and having excellent reserves will allow these projects to go forward.

The Public Works Department had a busy and productive year in 2016. We completed overlay projects for Drain Road and South Appleby and added 1100 square feet of sidewalk from Main Street to Double Springs intersection. This additional sidewalk has improved the safety for our children walking to school. A feasibility study was completed on 32 acres on Broyles street for our future Park and Public Works Building expansion. We are also looking to improve the safety in our city by adding additional Street Lights in each Ward of the City in 2017 along with reviewing our sidewalk needs in each Ward. I have attached a list of other accomplishments by our Public Works Department in 2016. The Highway 170 improvement project is in the final stage of the Design Phase and we hope to have final approval by October of 2017. Once the design phase is completed, we can begin our right of way acquisition phase to acquire the land needed to expand and improve this road from Highway 62 to Clyde Carnes Road. This project will be instrumental for the development of the land surrounding our new High School and providing the needed safety for our parents and children traveling this road. The funding for this project has been an 80/20 split with the State Highway Department.

Our Building inspection/code enforcement department under the leadership of Rick Bramall had an outstanding year in 2016. In 2016, there were 231 permits issued for a total of \$128,757 in permit fees. Of those permits, there were 30 new houses/duplexes with a value of \$11,515,000, 38 residential remodels or additions, with a value of \$994,423, 4 new commercial buildings that value \$21,831,000 and 7commercial remodels /additions which had a value of \$33,600. 751 building inspections were completed in 2016. Rick wrote 269 violation notices with a 98% compliance rate in 2016.

The Economic Growth in our city was strong for 2016. With the completion of the new Dairy Queen and other business expansion in 2016, our sales tax receipts should remain strong in 2017. Our Economic Development Committee will continue to explore ways to bring more businesses to Farmington and enhance the businesses who are located in Farmington now. Our economic growth will also include offering additional recreational options to our citizens.

Our planning commission continues to explore new ways to encourage economic growth. We have a very strong experienced planning commission that is dedicated to protecting the integrity of our city and providing direction for the future development in our city.

Our Sports complex has completed our 5th year of operation in 2016. Our Sports Park is a success and provided a great venue for the 502 kids in our summer ball programs. Our complex was the location of 7 tournaments in 2016 and have 6 tournaments on the schedule for 2017. We had 15 girls teams and 29 boys teams signed up in 2016. We had 27 teams participate in our Fall Ball Program in 2016. At the end of 2016, we acquired some additional land from Farmington Methodist Church that adjoins our complex to the East. This acquisition will allow us to have some overflow parking. We also did a seal and re-striping of the existing parking lot. By having a first class complex, the Farmington School Baseball and softball programs will have the ability to host local and regional tournaments which will bring additional people to our community.

Our Farmington Public library continues to be a successful and important part of our community. In 2016, the library welcomed approximately 32,000 visitors and circulated more than 55,000 items. Program and club participation increased with a record 2,239 participants. The Library issued 398 new library cards and had 3,925 public computer uses. Libraries bring communities together and are a destination to discover and learn. The Library presented a Summer Read kick-off celebration and hosted many clubs. There is no doubt that our City Library is a shining star in our community.

Our Police department has not had any employee turnover in 2016 and having a consistent and stable department is very important. The department worked 543 cases in 2016 which is a 7.5% increase and 172 accidents. With all of the new incidents throughout our nation, our department continues to stress the importance of technology to allow our officers to have the best equipment to protect our officers, City and our citizens. Our department continues to support education and training

of our officers. Our department has been very active in training our school personnel and I know from the feedback that I received from the school it was very much appreciated. I appreciate the council's continued support for our public safety departments and commitment to protect our citizens.

Our Fire Department responded to 924 calls in 2016 of which 63% were medical calls. The Fire Department has always done an excellent job in their response time and with the new addition of another full time fireman in 2016 our coverage has gone from 8 hours to 12 hour coverage and response times will improve. The continued support of our Volunteer Fireman is crucial for the continued success of our Fire Department in the future. In 2014, the Fire Department was able to lower our ISO rating from a class 4 to a Class 3 which was a great accomplishment for our department. By achieving the Class 3 rating it has been a benefit all homeowners and businesses in town with lower insurance premiums. Our goal is to one day have 24 hour coverage with our fire department.

In 2017, our City will continue the commitment to improve our communication avenues and to encourage economic growth. The lifeline of our city is to continue to see growth in the residential and commercial sectors. We must strive to improve all of our processes and to encourage growth within our city. As our City continues to grow it is imperative that our City Council make the commitment to grow our City Police and Fire services and make a commitment to have a full time Mayor in the very near future. Many of our sister cities in Northwest Arkansas with much smaller populations have already made that commitment. A full time Mayor will greatly enhance City involvement with businesses and improve our efficiencies in our day to day operations.

We will continue to work with our School, Chamber of Commerce and other civic groups to improve our city and offer the services that our citizens desire and need. I encourage our citizens to become involved, be better informed and volunteer their time to assist our City Committees achieve their goals in 2017.

In closing, I would like to thank the citizens of Farmington for their continued support of our city. It is an honor for me to serve as your Mayor and I look forward to a very successful and prosperous 2017 for the City of Farmington.

The Farmington Police Dept. had a busy 2016.

Officers worked 543 cases up 37 from 2015 which does not include calls for service where the officer spoke with someone and may have taken some kind of action to assist a citizen with no arrest.

Worked 172 accidents up 20 from 2015 and included one fatality accident on 12/16/16 in which a vehicle stuck a gas main. Many officers worked from 4 PM in the afternoon until 3 AM the next morning, diverting traffic, and on-lookers, assisting Gas Company and Electric Company.

The new garage was completed. This was a much needed addition that has allowed for work space for cars and storage space for files, evidence and ammunition.

We had the addition of a part-time officer, Kevin Apple, which has been very helpful to cover vacation and holiday vacancies.

Shop with the Cop was once again a success for both the community and the Officers. It's one of the few times during the year when we get to be the "Good Guys".

With all the violence across the nation and many fallen Officers; Farmington is very fortune all our Officers went home to their families every night.

State of the Fire department for 2016

2016 was an eventful year for the fire department with several major incidents happening for us. First we went to 12 hour shifts on our department because of all the increasing calls that we have been trying to cover. This was a big step toward having 24 hour coverage for our city that we so badly need, but we do not have the funds to do so this year but maybe soon we can accomplish this. We also added Active 911 to our notification system that has greatly enhanced our ability to get notified when someone is needing help, along with that we were able to purchase pad's for our main response vehicles that gives us routing to our calls and all the information that we need for the call. We also took on the awesome task on when we test all the fire hydrants we painted them for the first time in thirty years which made a big difference. We also applied for some grants and received two grants for the sum of thirty thousand dollars in which we purchased five SCBA's and new masks for our existing packs. We also had a few major fires in the city such as Razorback Muffler that we saved with little damage and this could have gotten very bad quick. Another one was on Neal street in which when firefighters arrived on scene they were met with an armed man threatening them with guns, so we had to retreat and let the police handle the situation before we could put the fire out. This type of thing just does not happen in our Farmington and it is just a wakeup to everyone that times are changing and we have to deal with them. We also had two large fires right before the end of the year, one of the largest incidents that we have had to deal with was the Gas Main fire. We had a man that we believe had a medical problem that ran off the road and took out a street sign then struck a gas main in which the vehicle burst into flames. The flames went about thirty feet into the air right beside Main street that also involved a duplex, in which the driver lost his life. We were able to contain the fire to the gas line and extinguish the duplex and keep the other businesses from catching on fire, we were on the scene for about thirteen hours. We also had a house that had two stories and had flames shooting out the upstairs window upon arrival; and we

were able to keep the damage to a minimum. We all in all had a good year with many calls answered and lives saved and property saved too, which is what we are all about.

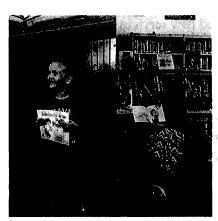

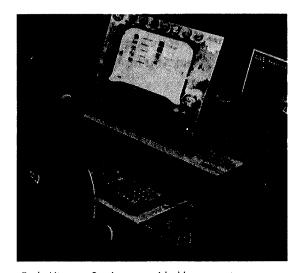

RESOLUTION NO. 2017-01

A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING THE PROCEDURAL RULES FOR THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON, ARKANSAS FOR 2017

WHEREAS, the State of Arkansas requires each City Council to annually establish its procedural rules and, whereas, such rules are essential for the orderly conduct of council activities;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON, ARKANSAS:

Section 1: Rules and Order of Business

The Council of the City of Farmington will follow the procedural rules contained in the Arkansas Municipal League publication "Procedural Rules for the Municipal Official", dated June 1987.

Section 2: The Time and Location of Regularly Scheduled Meetings

- (A) Council Meetings: Second Monday of each month at 6:00 p.m. at the City Hall, 354 West Main Street, Farmington, AR.
- (B) The date, time and locations of regularly scheduled meetings may be changed by the Mayor with consent of the majority of the council members. The media and public will be notified of any changes in accordance with appropriate state laws.

Section 3: Special Meetings

In accordance with Ordinance 1.4 the Mayor or any three council members may call special meetings and set the time and place of such meetings. Voting by council is permitted at special meetings.

Section 4: Working Sessions

The Mayor or any three council members may schedule working sessions for the council at the time and location of their choosing. The media and public will be notified of all working sessions in accordance with applicable state laws.

Voting by the council is not permitted at working sessions. The Mayor and all Council members must be notified of any proposed working session.

Section 5: Agendas

(A) Meetings

- (1) The City Clerk or designee shall prepare the agenda for council meetings. Items shall be placed upon the agenda as may be requested by the Mayor, the City Attorney, any Council member or any Department Head.
- (2) The department head and committee heads or their representative should be present at all monthly council meetings, give a **brief** written report summarizing their departmental/committee activities and make themselves available for questions from the public and council members. The committee and department reports shall be provided to the City Clerk or designee and be part of the official agenda.
- (4) At the citizens forum section of the meeting the Mayor will announce: "Comments from Citizens the Council will hear brief comments at this time from citizens. No action will be taken. All comments will be taken under advisement." Any individual wishing to address the Council about a subject that is not on the agenda shall be permitted to speak during that period allotted for Citizen Communications at meetings. Each individual will be limited to five minutes. (Total 15 minutes per subject.)
- (5) The Mayor, the City Attorney, any council member or any Department Head requesting that a matter be placed on the agenda will provide the City Clerk's office with the title of the matter and with a short memo (memo format can be obtained from the City Business Manager) describing the topic and any supporting material no later than noon on the Monday one week prior to the date of the Meetings.
- (6) Any matter presented to the City Clerk's office later than that time shall be placed on the agenda, unless Council objects, at a time called by the Mayor directly before the business items are addressed.
- (7) Those presenting items to be added to the agenda at the meeting shall state the topic to be added only, with no discussion. Discussion for that item will take place when the item is addressed during the business session.
- (8) The City Clerk will provide copies of the agenda unless a copy of the draft ordinance or resolution is provided to the City Clerk's office for inclusion with the agenda. Those with agenda items to be added at the meeting shall provide **nine** copies of any ordinances or resolutions to be presented to the Council, Mayor, City Clerk/Treasurer and City Attorney.
- (9) In the event of a holiday falling on a Monday, the above schedule will be shifted to the last two working days prior to the holiday.

(10) During Council meetings, the Council will consider only those matters placed on the agenda.

(B) Special Meetings

The City Clerk or designee will prepare agendas for special meetings and provide copies to all elected city officials and to the media and notify the media as required by state law. Whoever is calling the special meeting shall provide the Clerk with applicable documentation pertinent to the meeting being called.

ORDINANCE NO. 2017-1

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 7.1 TO DESIGNATE ZONING DISTRICTS FOR ON-PREMISE AND OFF-PREMISE SALE OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES IN THE CITY OF FARMINGTON

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Farmington, pursuant to authority granted by the Arkansas General Assembly in Title 14, Chapter 56, Subchapter 4 of the Arkansas Code of 1987 Annotated, as amended, has adopted zoning regulations to provide for orderly growth and development of Farmington, for protection of the character and stability of residential and commercial properties, and for other purposes; and

WHEREAS, the results of the City of Farmington Special Election on November 8, 2016 for the sale and manufacture of intoxicating liquors was certified by the Washington County Election Commission on November 21, 2016; and

WHEREAS, the Farmington Planning Commission, after careful consideration, has determined that on-premise and off-premise sale of alcoholic beverages should be limited to C-1 and C-2 Commercial zoning districts and R-0 Residential Office zoning district; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held on January 23, 2017, at which time the Farmington Planning Commission voted unanimously to adopt modifications to the zoning regulations for the city council's consideration.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON, ARKANSAS:

Section 1: That the zoning regulations should be and are hereby amended to allow the on-premise consumption of alcoholic beverages in dine-in restaurants, but not fast

food and drive-in style restaurants, in C-1 and C-2 Commercial zoning districts and the R-O Residential Office zoning district. The off-premise sale of alcoholic beverages shall be allowed in retail grocery stores, liquor stores and convenience stores in the C-2 zoning district and as a conditional use in the C-1 zoning district.

Section 2: Repealing Clause. All other ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 3: Severability Clause. In the event any part of this ordinance is declared inoperative or invalid as a result of a statute or judicial decision, then only that portion expressly so declared to be inoperative or invalid shall be affected thereby and all other provisions hereof shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 4: Emergency Clause. That the City Council of the City of Farmington, Arkansas further determines that it is necessary to enact this ordinance without delay due to the number of applications being submitted and currently pending before the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board; therefore, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

ORDINANCE NO. 2017-02

AN ORDINANCE ORDERING THE RAZING (DEMOLITION) AND REMOVAL OF A CERTAIN RESIDENTIAL STRUCTURE WITHIN THE CITY OF FARMINGTON, ARKANSAS, LOCATED AT 89 DOUBLE SPRINGS ROAD; TO DECLARE AN EMERGENCY AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, Billy McCormick and Caroline McCormick, are the owners of certain real property situated in Farmington, Washington County, Arkansas, more particularly described as follows:

Part of the Southwest Quarter (SW 1/4) of the Southeast Quarter (SE 1/4) of Section Twenty-two (22) in Township Sixteen (16) North of Range Thirty-one West, described as follows, to-wit: Beginning at a point 83.7 feet South of the Northeast corner of said forty acre tract, and running thence South 83 feet, thence West 150 feet, thence North 83 feet, thence East 150 feet to the point of beginning.

Subject to Protective Covenants and easements, if any.

Commonly known as 89 Double Springs Road, Farmington, Washington County, Arkansas
Tax Parcel No. 760-01346-000

WHEREAS, the structure on the property is unfit for human habitation as a result of a fire, the remaining structure is dangerous to human life as it constitutes a hazard to safety or health by reason of inadequate maintenance, dilapidation, obsolescence, or abandonment, and further is unsightly, and is considered an unsafe and unsightly structure in violation of Farmington City Ordinances (Title 11, Chapter 11.04, § 11.04.04);

WHEREAS, the owner has been notified by the City of Farmington prior to the consideration of this ordinance, that the structure on the property is in violation of various ordinances of the City of Farmington;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Title 11, Chapter 11.04 of the Ordinances of the City of Farmington, the owner was given thirty (30) days to purchase a building permit and to

commence repairs on the property, or to demolish and remove the building from the property;

WHEREAS, the owner has failed, neglected, or refused to comply with the notice to repair, rehabilitate or to demolish and remove the building, and as such, the matter of removing the building may be referred to the City Council pursuant to Chapter 11.04, § 115.4 of the Ordinances of the City of Farmington;

WHEREAS, under Ark. Code Ann. § 14-56-203 and pursuant to Title 11, Chapter 11.04 of the Farmington City Ordinances, if repair or removal is not done within the required time, the structure is to be razed (demolished) and/or removed;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL FOR THE CITY OF FARMINGTON, ARKANSAS:

<u>Section 1</u>. That the structure located at 89 Double Springs Road, Farmington, Arkansas, is dilapidated, unsightly, and unsafe; and it is in the best interests of the City of Farmington to proceed with the removal of this dilapidated, unsightly, and unsafe structure.

Section 2. That the owner is hereby ordered to raze (demolish) and remove the dilapidated, unsightly and unsafe structure located on the aforesaid property; and, is further ordered to abate the unsightly conditions on the property. Said work shall be commenced within ten (10) days and shall be completed within thirty (30) days from the passage of this ordinance. The manner of razing (demolishing) and removing said structure shall be to dismantle by hand or bulldoze and then dispose of all debris, completely cleaning up the property to alleviate any unsightly conditions, in a manner consistent with the Farmington City Ordinances, and all other state laws and regulations pertaining to the demolition or removal of residential structures.

<u>Section 3.</u> If the aforesaid work is not commenced within ten (10) days or completed within thirty (30) days, the Mayor, or the Mayor's authorized representative, is hereby directed to cause the aforesaid structure to be razed (demolished) and removed and the unsafe, unsanitary and unsightly conditions abated; and, the City of Farmington shall have a lien upon the aforesaid described real property for the cost of razing (demolishing) and removing said structure and abating said aforementioned conditions, said costs to be determined at a hearing before the City Council.

<u>Section 4</u>. **EMERGENCY CLAUSE:** The City Council hereby determines that the aforesaid unsafe structure constitutes a continuing detriment to the public safety and welfare and is therefore a nuisance, and determines that unless the provisions of this ordinance are put into effect immediately, the public health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Farmington will be adversely affected. Therefore, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance begin necessary for the public health, safety and welfare shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

The Fire department responded to 91 calls during the month of January and that is above average for the year for runs, but it seems like every January has a lot of runs. The conditions are still dry but we have received very little rain and as a result we have had a lot of fires.

Seems like the weather dictates a lot of things that we do in the fire service and how we do things, if we are having bad weather we deal with a lot of problems of houses destroyed by wind or lighting strikes and if we are having dry weather we have a lot of fires. We have a whole different line of problems if too much rain, we have more swift water rescues and flooding problems. If we have high hot weather we have heat strokes and issues and medical heat related problems. If we are having extreme cold temperatures we have trouble getting to places and hypothermia calls. I say all this just to say that we have become an all hazard department instead of just a fire department, because of this we have to be trained on a lot of different hazards to be able to handle the situations that come our way, and January is the month that we do a lot of this training.

I hope by this meeting to have our year-end report for you but right now all the figures are not in, but when it becomes available you will have it.

Having all these calls have put a strain on our volunteers being able to respond to all of the calls that we are experiencing and if we have to get up in the middle of the night some may not go at all because of lack of sleep. That is why I hope you would keep us in mind to add a couple firefighters so we could have someone around the clock to make calls 24/7.
