### Minutes of the Regular Farmington City Council Meeting January 12, 2015

The regular meeting of the Farmington City Council scheduled for Monday January 12, 2015 was called to order at 6:00 pm by Mayor Ernie Penn. City Clerk Kelly Penn called the roll and the following Aldermen answered to their names: Patsy Pike, Sherry Mathews, Keith Lipford, Linda Bell, Brenda Cunningham, Bobby Morgan, Diane Bryant and Shelly Parsley. Also present were City Attorney Tennant, City Business Manager McCarville and Financial Officer Jimmy Story.

**Approval of the minutes for the December 8, 2014 City Council Meeting** – On the motion of Alderman Bryant and seconded by Alderman Lipford and by the consent of all members present, the minutes were approved as presented.

**Financial Reports** –City Clerk Penn advised that city sales tax was up \$16,810.65, county sales tax was up \$6,489.66. Year to date totals were city sales tax up \$108,897.85 and county sales tax up \$32,377.52 for a total increase of \$141,275.37. True year to date numbers will be reported in March.

**Entertain a motion to read all Ordinances and Resolutions by title only** - On the motion of Alderman Cunningham and seconded by Alderman Lipford and by the consent of all members present, the motion was approved.

**Proclamations, Special Announcements, Committee/Commission Appointments** – Jeff Hartley from Ozark Regional Transit gave the council a brief overview of the system's quarterly numbers.

A work session for the council has been set for February 2 at 5:30 at City Hall.

**Committee Reports** - Street Committee Chairman Morgan provided the council with a list of projects they hope to complete in 2015.

### **New Business**

Resolution 2015-01 A resolution providing for the adoption of the amended budget for the City of Farmington, Arkansas for the 12 months beginning January 1, 2014 and ending December 31, 2014; appropriating money for each item, and for other purposes.

On the motion of Alderman Lipford and seconded by Alderman Mathews and by the consent of all members present, the motion to adopt Resolution 2015-01 was approved. .

Resolution 2015-02 A resolution expressing the willingness of the City of Farmington to utilize Federal-Aid funds for the HWY 62- Clyde Carnes Road. (HWY 170); Agreement of Understanding Between City of Farmington and the Arkansas Highway and Transportation Department

On the motion of Alderman Morgan and seconded by Alderman Bryant and by the consent of all members present, the motion to adopt Resolution 2015-02 was approved.

Ordinance 2015-01 An Ordinance providing minimum energy standards for the design of new buildings and structures or portions and additions to existing buildings that provide facilities or shelter for public assembly, education, business, mercantile, institutional, storage, and residential occupancies, as well as those portions of factory and industrial occupancies designed primarily for human occupancy by regulating their exterior envelopes and the selection of their HVAC, service water heating, electrical distribution and illuminating systems and equipment for effective use of energy.

A motion was made by Alderman Cunningham and seconded by Alderman Lipford to suspend the rule requiring the reading of Ordinance 2015-01 in full 3 different dates and to be read one time by title only. It was approved by all members present. City Attorney Tennant read the Ordinance by title only. Mayor Penn asked shall the Ordinance pass, it was approved by all members present.

A motion was made by Alderman Cunningham and seconded by Alderman Lipford to pass Ordinance 2015-01 with an emergency clause. It was approved by all members present.

Request approval of contracts from EDA for MS4 Stormwater Compliance and Floodplain Administration.

On the motion of Alderman Pike and seconded by Alderman Mathews and by the consent of all members present, the motion to approve the EDA Contracts for MS4 Stormwater Compliance and Floodplain Administration was approved.

Request approval to remove HP LaserJet P4015n printer from inventory, tag # 0367, Serial # CNDY203413

On the motion of Alderman Bryant and seconded by Alderman Bell and by the consent of all members present, the motion to request removal of the HP Laserjet Printer P4015n from inventory, Tag # 0367, Serial Number # CNDY203413 was approved.

There being no further business to come before the council and on the motion of Alderman Pike and seconded by Alderman Mathews and by the consent of all members present, the meeting adjourned at 6:45 pm until the next regularly scheduled meeting to be held Monday February 9, 2015 at 6:00 pm, in the City Council Chambers in City Hall, located at 354 West Main Street, Farmington, Arkansas.





### January 2015 Monthly Report for Mayor and City Council

January was the busiest month that we had ever had for the fire department because we have had a lot of calls for service. We had a total of 107 calls for the month and that is more than we have ever recorded and we had no storms or ice storms to deal with either, so this unprecedented for us. This time of the year it is getting cold and dry so you expect more fires, but most of these are other hazards and medical calls.

The fire service has become such an all hazard service that we get calls for everything and a lot of these are coming at night when all we have is volunteers to make the calls. It's a good thing that I have several new firefighters on the department now to learn and they have not found out yet just how taxing this is on your life, because you are gone on calls so much of the time. If this month is an indicator how it is going to be we are going to have trouble keeping our new firefighters.

I would like the council to consider adding some more paid help to work the night shift. We are in need of getting coverage during the late hours and I think it is time to go to 24/7 coverage if we can at all. Our call volume steadily continues to climb and stretches us to our limits. Last year we ran almost 850 calls for the year and that's unbelievable for a city of our size.

It was an exciting year at the Farmington Public Library as we completed our first year at our new location. We are proud to celebrate a decade of serving the City of Farmington and that the library continues to be a well utilized and vibrant gathering place for the community.

In 2014 the library welcomed approximately 30,000 visitors and circulated more than 56,000 items. We focused on promoting digital literacy, highlighting local authors, and creating a welcoming and modern space to meet the evolving needs of our users. Program participation increased 38% over 2013. The library hosted two local author talks with five authors participating.

Libraries bring communities together and are a destination to discover and learn. Being an advocate of your library shows others that the library is a valuable resource to you and the community. We believe in serving every user either in person or virtually. With online catalog logins up 28% over the previous year, customers received 500 more hold requests using the online catalog than they did in 2013.

We are grateful to you and we appreciate the financial support of Washington County taxpayers, elected officials, volunteers, and generous donors.

**Public Hearing A. Variance Request – signs:** Lance Drinkard, Marketing Manager for Lewis Automotive, presented a Variance Request for Lewis Automotive, located at 322 East Main Street, for a wall sign on west side of building. It was determined that the sign that will be placed on the north (front) wall of building does not require a variance. It will be in red, white and blue and will not utilize blinking or flashing lights.

Rick Bramall stated that the requested variance for the west sign is 11 square feet.

There were no comments from the public.

Chairman Mann called for question regarding a variance in sign size for the Lewis Automotive location. Passed unanimously.

**Public Hearing B. Adoption of 2014 Arkansas Energy Code:** City Building Official Rick Bramall explained that cities must adopt new standards for the 2014 Energy Code. Options for adoption were Prescriptive which requires R-38 for ceilings, R-13 for walls, R-19 for floors and a window U factor of .35. Also, the electrical panel must include a statement that states the house complies with the energy code.

The other option is the "Trade-Off" method which is more complicated and would require additional testing. Brammall recommended adopting the Prescriptive method.

Bramall further explained that the new code will apply to: a. all new construction, b. new addition to existing building or home.

Chairman Mann called for question regarding adoption of the new 2014 Arkansas Energy Code. Passed unanimously.

**Public Hearing** – Renewal of Conditional Use on Appeal Request – renewal of home daycare for property owned by Rebecca Keeton, 23 Ash Street. Rebecca Keeton was present. She cares for 7 children. There were no comments from the public.

Conditional Use appeal was unanimously approved.

### **New Business:**

**Large Scale Development: Broyles Street Storage** - Property owned by Broyles Street Storage, 285 Broyles Street, presented by Jorge Du Quesne of Blew & Associates. There were no questions from Commissioners and no public comments.

The Development plan, with inclusion of City Engineer Chris Brackett's recommendations (attached), was approved unanimously.

**Preliminary Plat: Holland Crossing Duplexes** – Property owned by Rausch Coleman; location 4735 Alberta Street. Zak Johnston of Crafton Tull Engineers represented the company.

City Engineer Brackett reviewed the conditions for approval they are listed on the attached memo.

City Attorney Steve Tennant had requested a copy of the Bylaws for the development at last meeting but had not received them as of this meeting. He requested them again and to be available by the Final Plat Review. He also emphasized the need for a managerial association that will enforce covenants and other rules and regulations if the POA Board does not function which

often occurs when POA members are unwilling to serve as officers or board members, or even to be active members.

Diane Bryant, a Valley View resident, stated that it is very difficult to get people to serve on the POA Board, but it is very important to have an active POA.

Dana Danvers of Rausch-Coleman agreed to resubmit the covenants and Bylaws. She noted that Rausch-Coleman has agreed to make all changes asked for by Commissioners at the last Planning Commission meeting.

There were no other comments from the audience.

Commissioners asked several questions:

Is there adequate drainage so that adjacent property owners will not be flooded by water runoff and City Engineer believes drainage will be adequate for 100 year flood;

who maintains the required landscaping – Zack Johnston said the property owner is responsible for maintenance of landscaping on her/his property;

Will Rausch-Coleman be willing to meet additional landscaping requirements not included in their Landscape Plan presented at this November 24 meeting and they agreed to work with City Engineer Chris Brackett to make adjustments as needed.

Chairman Mann called for question to approve Holland Crossing duplexes preliminary plat contingent upon conditions as set forth by City Attorney and City Engineer. Commissioners Clary, Schader, Hutcherson, Bahn, Horne, and Wilson voted "aye." Commissioner Harris recused.

Re: Preliminary Plat for the Holland Crossings Duplex Subdivision

The Preliminary Plat for the Holland Crossings Duplex Subdivision has been reviewed and it is our opinion that the Planning Commission's approval should be conditional on the following comments.

- 1. The detention pond for the Holland Crossing Commercial Subdivision shall be sodded or have grass established to the City's satisfaction prior to a Final Plat being submitted to the City.
- 2. A fee payment in Lieu of Park Land Conveyance will be required prior to the City signing the Final Plat for this subdivision. This fee will be \$300 for each multi-family unit or \$15,000 as the plat is currently shown.
- 3. The fire hydrant locations and fire access road shown on the plat and the utility plans must be reviewed and approved by the Fire Department.
- 4. The water and sewer improvements must be reviewed and approved by the City of Fayetteville Engineering Department and the Arkansas Department of Health prior to any construction activities.
- 5. Any work within the City of Fayetteville's Alberta Street right-of-way must be reviewed and approved by the City of Fayetteville Engineering Department prior to any construction activities.
- 6. After a final review set of plans and drainage report has been approved by MWY, the applicant should submit to the City three (3) sets of full size plans and two (2) sets of half size plans, and two (2) more copies of the final drainage report that have been sealed by the engineer for final approval and distribution.
