Minutes of the Regular Farmington City Council Meeting on June 13, 2011

The regular meeting of the Farmington City Council scheduled for Monday, June 13th 2011 was called to order at 6:00 p.m. by Mayor Ernie Penn. City Clerk Kelly Thomas called the roll and the following Alderman answered to their names: Patsy Pike, Sherry Mathews, Keith Lipford, Brenda Cunningham, Shelly Parsley, Bobby Morgan and Terry Yopp, a quorum was declared (7). Alderwoman Steele was absent. After Mayor Penn led the pledge of allegiance, he then opened the public comment portion of the meeting for citizens.

Public Comment

Several residents that were affected by the recent flooding spoke to the council regarding how their homes were impacted: Nancy Harris 11035 Rose Bay Lane, Julie Latl 11131 Rose Bay Lane, Daniel Kelsey 145 Rainsong, Russell Peas 11047 Rose Bay Lane, Judy Pasenda 11143 Rose Bay Lane, David Peas 11083 Rose Bay Lane, Jim Harris 11035 Rose Bay Lane,

Approval of the minutes for Regular Meeting May 9, 2011 and Special Meeting May 26, 2011 - On the motion of Alderman Lipford and seconded by Alderwoman Cunningham and by the consent of all members present, the minutes were approved, accepted and filed as prepared by the City Clerk (7).

Financial Reports – City Clerk Thomas informed the council that city sales tax was down \$4,491.51 and county sales tax was up \$18,105.88.

Entertain a motion to read all Ordinances and Resolutions by title only — On the motion of Alderman Morgan and seconded by Alderman Lipford and by the consent of all members present (7), it was approved to read all Ordinances and Resolutions by title only at this meeting.

Proclamations, Special Announcements, Committee/Commission Appointments

Mayor Penn awarded keys to the city to the Farmington High School All State Athletes and recognized the Farmington Lady Cardinal State Championship Softball Team.

Committee Reports

Street – Alderman Morgan informed the council that Flynn Road project was complete. They are waiting to meet with FEMA and expect to bid Clyde Carnes Road & Archie Watkins Road in the next month.

City Beautification – Alderwoman Cunningham informed the council the committee was still waiting on permits for lights from the State Highway Department. They are ready to move forward and place a sign on the east side of the city and asked for direction from the council to proceed. On the motion of Alderman Yopp and a second by Alderman Lipford, approval was given to proceed with the project not to exceed \$5000.00. (7)

Economic Development – Per Mayor Penn, they are waiting to set up a meeting with merchants.

Finance - No Business.

Parks & Recreation –Alderwoman Mathews informed the council the committee had met and were getting prices on several items for the Sports Complex.

Sewer - Alderman Yopp advised the Highway 62 project will be completed within 10 days.

Request approval to accept Northaven Drainage Bid.

On the motion of Alderman Lipford and seconded by Alderwoman Mathews and by the consent of six members present and Alderman Morgan abstaining (6 -0-1), it was approved to accept the bid from Fotchman Construction for \$23,130.00. All homeowners affected will be notified in writing.

Request approval of contract with Davis, Ray and Ernst.

On the motion of Alderman Yopp and seconded by Alderwoman Parsley and by the consent of all members present (7), it was approved to approve the contract with Davis, Ray & Ernst with regards to Strategic Planning.

Resolution 2011-01 to enter into an Interlocal Cooperation Agreement to participate in the TAPS Cooperative Purchasing Plan –

On the motion of Alderman Yopp and seconded by Alderwoman Pike and by the consent of all members present (7), the resolution was approved. City Attorney Tennant read the Resolution. Mayor Penn asked Shall this pass? It was approved by all members present (7).

Report on Waste Management Contract - City Attorney Tennant

A brief report was given to the council reflecting some of the changes for the contract with Waste Management.

Request approval of bid for lights and installation for Farmington Sports Complex

A motion was made by Alderman Yopp and seconded by Alderwoman Parsley to accept the bid from Musco Lighting for \$368,000 plus tax (initially we will pay \$37,720 in tax but will get a rebate for (\$37,463.75) and Pick-It construction for \$179,350.00 for a total of \$585,070.00. 1. City Identification Sign - East of City

Brenda reported that the City Council has approved expenditure of \$5,000 for the sign to be placed on Highway 62 (Main Street) at east edge. The total cost for the first sign was \$4,262.69.

Jeff Bates will do the engineering without charge and Russell House will do the construction work at same fee as the first sign at west edge of the city. The necessary retaining wall will cost approximately \$1,500.

Rausch-Coleman will be asked to move their sign back north of present location.

Brenda mentioned that Steve Davis had talked with City of Fayetteville to get their OK to put sign there, but didn't discuss the retaining wall with them.

Dirt from the new baseball park can be used for any fill dirt that is needed.

The steps determined to be needed for the sign were:

- 1) Have Jeff Bates complete survey so we know for sure whether land is in Farmington or Fayetteville
- 2) If in Fayetteville, take steps to get sign approved by City of Fayetteville. Was suggested that perhaps Mayor Ernie Penn could talk with the Mayor of Fayetteville.
- 3) Dirt and retaining wall will be built
- 4) Hole dug for the large rock
- 5) Large rock is set (Delivery charge for rock will be approximately \$200
- 6) Top soil added for plantings
- 7) SWEPCO drops a meter
- 8) Lighting and electrical work completed by an electrician

2. Christmas Lighting by Businesses

Brenda and Melissa McCarville talked about encouraging businesses to decorate their businesses for Christmas this year. It was decided to send out a letter in September encouraging them to decorate. Judy will draft a letter. Addresses can be obtained from the City.

Another letter will be sent in October as another encouragement and reminder.

3. Main Street Street Lights

Joe Shipman of Arkansas State Highway Department sent a list of the ASHD requirements that must be met before they will issue a permit for new lighting.

Once this is settled and cost is determined, then a campaign to ask for donations can begin.

Locations selling the type of lights preferred was discussed, including Kings River Nursery in Huntsville. Brent Vinson will visit Branson to evaluate their street lights.

The estimated cost of installation will be approximately \$1,000 per light.

ORDINANCE NO. 2011-04

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE WIRELESS TELECOMMUNICATIONS ORDINANCE FOR THE CITY OF FARMINGTON, ARKANSAS

WHEREAS, An ordinance was adopted on August 10, 2009 to provide a comprehensive wireless telecommunications facilities application and permit process to ensure the placement, construction or modification of wireless telecommunications facilities to establish a balanced, fair and efficient process for review and approval of such facilities to protect the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the City of Farmington; and

WHEREAS, the City of Farmington adopted a revised Zoning Ordinance on March 14, 2011 to aid in the implementation of a revised land use plan to promote, in accordance with present and future needs, the safety, order, convenience, prosperity, and general welfare of the citizens and provide additional types of zoning districts; and

WHEREAS, the Wireless Telecommunications Ordinance should be amended to include the placement of wireless telecommunications facilities in the newly formed zoning districts; and

WHEREAS, the Farmington Planning Commission voted unanimously to approve the ordinance after a public hearing was held on Monday, June 27, 2011.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON, ARKANSAS THAT:

Section 1: That Section 14 pertaining to facilities in the Wireless Telecommunications Ordinance should be and is hereby amended in its entirety to read as follows:

§ 14 LOCATION AND TYPE OF FACILITIES.

- (A) Applicants for wireless telecommunications facilities shall locate, site and erect wireless telecommunications facilities in accordance with the following priorities, with (1) being the highest priority and (6) being the lowest priority, as follows:
- (1) On existing towers or other structures without increasing the height of the tower or structure and using monopole towers, stealth facilities and technology or panel antennas;
- (2) On existing towers or other structures without increasing the overall height of the tower or structure by more

- than ten (10) feet and using monopole towers, stealth facilities and technology or panel antennas;
- (3) The placement of multiple, shorter towers utilizing monopole towers, stealth facilities and technology or placing panel antennas on existing structures in lieu of increasing the height of existing towers or other structures;
- Agriculture (A-1) that are a minimum of eighty (80) acres, but in no event within 1,500 feet of any residential structure of any adjoining property owner and any lot in a platted residential subdivision; and must be a monopole tower utilizing stealth facilities and technology or panel antennas and placed in heavily wooded areas on the site to the maximum extent possible so as to lessen the visual intrusiveness of the telecommunications structure and accessory structures; and in no event shall towers or antennas exceed the maximum height of 100 feet;
- (5) On properties and structures in areas zoned Highway Commercial (C-2), but in no event within 1,000 feet from any residential structure of any adjoining property owner and any lot in a platted residential subdivision; and must be a monopole tower utilizing stealth facilities and technology or panel antennas; and in no event shall towers or antennas exceed the maximum height of 60 feet;
- (6) On properties and structures in areas zoned Residential Estate (RE-1) and Single-Family Residential (R-1), but in no event within 1,000 feet from any residential structure of any adjoining property owner and any lot in a platted residential subdivision; and must be a monopole tower utilizing stealth facilities and technology or panel antennas; and in no event shall towers or antennas exceed the maximum height of 60 feet;
- (7) On city-owned properties or structures (provided space is available, loading is within the structure's capacity, and the city deems the use appropriate) and must be constructed of a monopole tower utilizing stealth facilities and technology or panel antenna and in no event shall towers or antennas exceed the maximum height of 50 feet.
- (B) Lattice towers and guyed towers will not be allowed under any circumstances in any zoning district in the city.
- (C) No wireless telecommunications facilities shall be permitted on properties and structures in areas zoned Park, School, Residential Estate (RE-2), Single-Family Residential (R-2), Residential-Office (R-O), Single and Multi-Family Residential (MF-1), Multi-Family (MF-2), Mobile Home Park (MHP) and General Commercial (C-1).

- (D) An applicant may not bypass sites of higher priority by stating the site proposed is the only site leased or selected without a demonstration that the site is necessary to eliminate a gap in coverage and provide sufficient capacity and there are no structurally suitable vertical structures within two miles of the proposed site. An application shall address co-location on vertical structures within one mile of the proposed site as an option. If that option is not proposed, the applicant must explain why co-location is not reasonably possible or practicable under the standards set forth in this ordinance.
- The applicant shall submit written evidence demonstrating the applicant's review of the above locations in order of priority, and demonstrating the technological reason for the site selection. If the proposed site is not proposed for the highest priority listed above, then a detailed written explanation must be provided as to why a site of a higher priority was not selected. The person seeking such an exception must demonstrate why a permit should be granted for the proposed site and the service-related problems that would result if the permit were not granted for the proposed site. Increased cost of locating and constructing a facility in a higher priority location or the increased cost of constructing or providing monopole towers, stealth facilities and technology or panel antennas is not a sufficient reason to approve a permit under this section.
- (F) Notwithstanding that a potential site may be situated in an area of highest priority or highest available priority, the city may disapprove an application for any of the following reasons:
- (1) Conflict with safety and safety-related codes and requirements;
- (2) Conflict with the historic nature or character of the site;
- (3) The placement and location of wireless telecommunications facilities which would create an unreasonable risk, physical harm or safety arising from a collapse, structural failure or weather related safety issues all relating to the facilities;
 - (4) Conflicts with the provisions of this ordinance.
- Section 2: That Section 16(A) pertaining to the height of towers and antennas in the Wireless Telecommunications Ordinance should be and is hereby amended in its entirety to read as follows:
- § 16 HEIGHT OF TOWERS; COMPLIANCE WITH CODES AND REGULATIONS.
- (A) Notwithstanding the maximum height of towers and antennas allowed in Section 14, no tower or antenna shall exceed the maximum height necessary to eliminate gaps in coverage or

otherwise to provide service, as demonstrated by the propagation studies submitted under paragraph (H)(2) of Section 7. Under no circumstances shall a tower or antenna exceed the height of 100 feet when its location is proposed on properties zoned Agriculture (A-1) and under no circumstances shall a tower or antenna exceed the height of 60 feet when its location is proposed on properties zoned Residential Estate (RE-1), Single-Family Residential (R-1) or Highway Commercial (C-2) as required herein. Further, all proposed towers shall be constructed of monopole stealth facilities and technology, and panel antennas shall be utilized on existing structures when possible. And further, applicants shall utilize the latest advancements in telecommunication technology and stealth technology that is developed after the effective date of this ordinance to make towers and antennas more inconspicuous to minimize adverse aesthetic and visual impacts on the land, property, buildings, and other existing facilities that may be adjacent to, surrounding, and in generally the same area of a proposed wireless telecommunication facility regardless of its cost.

Section 3: That Section 20 pertaining to setbacks for all proposed towers and any other proposed wireless telecommunications facility structures in the Wireless Telecommunications Ordinance should be and is hereby amended in its entirety to read as follows:

§ 20 SETBACKS.

Without regard to property boundaries, all proposed towers and any other proposed wireless telecommunications facilities shall be no less than 1,500 feet from any residential structure of any adjoining property owner and any lot in a platted residential subdivision when the proposed location of the telecommunications structure is in a district zoned Agriculture (A-1) that is a minimum of eighty (80) acres as required herein. When the proposed location of the telecommunications structure is in a district zoned Residential Estate (RE-1), Single-Family Residential (R-1) or Highway Commercial (C-2), all proposed towers and any other proposed wireless telecommunications facilities shall be no less than 1,000 feet from any residential structure of any adjoining property owner and any lot in a platted residential subdivision, without regard to the property boundaries. Further, all proposed towers and any other proposed wireless telecommunications facility structures along recorded rights-of-way, roads and streets shall be a sufficient distance from same to assure safety of persons and structures in the vicinity. A standard of acceptable distance from rights-of-way, roads and streets shall be equal to or greater than the height of the proposed tower or wireless telecommunications facility structure. Applicants proposing a shorter setback shall demonstrate ancillary safety precautions in the design of the structure to justify the setback variance.

Section 4: That all remaining provisions and regulations in Ordinance 2009-06 shall remain in full force and effect.

Repealing Clause. All other ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Severability Clause. In the event any part Section 6: of the ordinance is declared inoperative or invalid as a result of a statute or judicial decision, then only that portion expressly so declared to be inoperative or invalid shall be affected thereby and all other provisions hereof shall remain in full force and effect.

Emergency Clause. That the City Council of Section 7: the City of Farmington, Arkansas further determines that this ordinance is necessary to provide conformity with and between the Wireless Telecommunications Ordinance and the revised Zoning Ordinance, and that this ordinance should be adopted without delay; therefore, an emergency is hereby declared and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.


