Minutes of the Regular Farmington City Council Meeting on July 8, 2013

The regular meeting of the Farmington City Council scheduled for Monday, July 8, 2013 was called to order at 6:00 p.m. by Mayor Ernie Penn. City Clerk Kelly Penn called the roll and the following Aldermen answered to their names: Patsy Pike, Sherry Mathews, Keith Lipford, Janie Steele, Brenda Cunningham, Bobby Morgan, Terry Yopp and Shelly Parsley. A quorum was declared (8). Also present were City Business Manager McCarville and City Attorney Tennant. After Mayor Penn led the pledge of allegiance, he then opened the public comment portion of the meeting for citizens. There were no speakers

Approval of the minutes for Regular June 10, 2013 and Special June 17, 2013 Meetings On the motion of Alderman Yopp and seconded by Alderman Lipford and by the consent of all members present, the minutes were approved, accepted and filed as amended by the City Clerk (8/0).

Financial Reports – City Clerk Penn advised that city sales tax was down \$1,457.10, County sales tax was up \$2,028.73 for a total increase of \$571.63.

Entertain a motion to read all Ordinances and Resolutions by title only – On the motion of Alderman Yopp and seconded by Alderwoman Steele and by the consent of all members present (8/0), it was approved to read all Ordinances and Resolutions by title only at this meeting.

Proclamations, Special Announcements, Committee/Commission Appointments – There were none.

Committee Reports

Street Committee – Alderman Morgan advised the state had funded the Rheas Mill project; start date could possibly be in September but was dependent on weather conditions. Holland Drive project will be put out for bids soon also.

City Beautification Committee – Alderwoman Cunningham advised they are replacing solar lights at the welcome sign by Legend Realty.

Economic Development Committee - Alderman Yopp advised the committee met and in order for a hotel to be put in Farmington most are franchise purchases, so there would have to be an individual willing to finance the project. Dale Reed from PG Telco will be their next speaker and his topic will be fiber optics.

Parks & Recreation Committee – Alderwoman Mathews advised they are still looking for a brick mason to finish the sports complex project.

Finance Committee – No meeting.

Historical Preservation Committee – Alderwoman Steele advised they are researching the civil war and our area, from Pea Ridge to Prairie Grove, our area was one of the hardest hit according to research.

Ordinance No. 2013-03 Prescribing and Regulating Landscaping – 2nd Reading

A motion was made by Alderwoman Cunningham and seconded by Alderman Yopp to suspend the rules and place Ordinance 2013-03 on its second and final reading and to be read one time by title only, it was approved by the consent of all members present (8/0). City Attorney Tennant read the Ordinance. Mayor Penn asked shall the ordinance pass. It was approved by the consent of all members present (8/0).

A motion was made by Alderwoman Mathews and seconded by Alderwoman Cunningham remove & destroy HP Printer CP 3525DN from Police Department Inventory. . It was approved by the consent of all members present (8/0).

Ordinance No. 2013-05 Vacate Property adjacent to 125 Terry

Resident Mindy Houston addressed the council regarding the request and gave the council a brief overview of the drainage issue and their plans for a concrete driveway. A motion was made by Alderman Yopp and seconded by Alderwoman Pike to suspend the rule requiring the reading of Ordinance 2013-05 in full in 3 different dates and to be read one time by title only, it was approved by the consent of all members present (8/0). City Attorney Tennant read the Ordinance. Mayor Penn asked shall the ordinance pass. It was approved by the consent of all members present (8/0).

Recommendation

Betty, the Mayor and Melissa have discussed this increase and agree that it is needed.

Background

As you know, Audra has taken a leave from her position in the library due to an illness in her family. While she is gone Rachel, who is the only other full time employee, has had to take on additional responsibilities to manage the library in Audra's absence. Rachel will also have the added responsibility of training a new staff member as they have recently had one of their part time employees resign.

Discussion

Rachel now at a 3A (\$10.09 an hour), the request is to move her to a 4C (\$11.24 an hour). According to our personnel policy this kind of increase cannot be accomplished without City Council approval. We are asking to back date the effective date for the beginning of the current payroll period.

Budget Impact

With the current staff this increase will cause the payroll budget to go over by approximately \$2,000. This will possibly be balanced out, depending on the time it takes to replace the part time employee. Whatever overage they have in their payroll budget will have to be taken out of another category in their budget. The library staff understands and has no problem with this.

Recommendation

Planning Commission voted unanimously to approve the rezoning request from R-1 to MF-2

Background

This property is 2.6 acres of property that forms a triangle on Hwy 170 (please refer to the map with the rezoning application). It is adjacent on 2 sides by duplexes; the third side is some single family homes along the Hwy.

Discussion

Attached is a description of MF-2 zoning. The developer is indicating, at this time, the property would be used for duplexes. Keep in mind that any multifamily residential unit is a permitted use under MF-2 zoning and could be constructed on this property once the zoning is approved. Remember you are not approving the specific use; you are approving the MF-2 zoning. There were a few adjacent property owners in attendance at the planning commission meeting however they did not object to the rezoning they were interested in clarification.

Permitted uses include business and professional offices, business and professional services; art and teaching studios, barber and beauty shops, single-family in combination with any of the above uses, duplexes, multi-family, veterinary clinic with no overnight accommodations, governmental offices, essential governmental facilities and services and uses customarily accessory to permitted uses.

Conditional uses may include child care family home and utility facilities such as electric regulating stations or pressure control stations.

Occupation permitted in residential structures utilized for residential purposes in the residential and agricultural districts. An occupation may be carried on in a residential structure in the R-O and A-1 Districts only when:

- (A) Does not require the use of more than fifteen (15) percent of the living area.
- (B) Does not require the use of an accessory building or yard space or any activity outside the main structure not normally associated with the residential uses.
- (C) Does not have a sign in excess of four square feet in area to denote the business, occupation or profession, and such sign must be attached to the structure.
- (D) Does not involve the outside display of goods and services.
- (E) The person operating the home occupation must be the person residing in the residential structure.
- (F) The person requesting a home occupation shall submit a request for the proposed use to the Planning Commission for approval.
- (7) MF-1 Single and Multi-family Residential. This district is characterized by single and multi-family residential development on medium-density lots of at least 7,500 square feet. As with other residential zones, this district also serves as a buffer in providing for a graduation in intensity from higher to lower density residential development.

Permitted uses include single-family detached dwelling, multi-family units, and essential governmental facilities and services.

Conditional uses include churches and schools, and utility facilities such as electric regulating stations or pressure control stations.

(8) MF-2 Multi-Family Residential. The purpose of this district is to provide for high density residential development for attached living complexes. A minimum of 6,000 square feet of land is required for each dwelling unit. Municipal utility services must be available to be zoned in this classification.

Permitted uses include multi-family units and essential governmental facilities and services.

Conditional uses include utility facilities such as electric regulating stations.

(9) MHP Mobile Home Park District. The purpose of the Mobile Home Park District is to provide areas within the city for the placement of mobile homes; to recognize existing mobile home parks and to allow for their expansions or the establishment of new facilities; and to provide a variety of housing types for all income levels.

Permitted uses shall include mobile homes, laundry facilities (for the mobile home park only), special recreation facilities, essential government facilities and services and uses customarily accessory to permitted uses.

AN ORDINANCE REZONING PROPERTIES CONTAINING APPROXIMATELY .18 ACRES (391 S. HUNTER) AND ADJACENT 2.42 ACRES (PARCEL NO. 760-01533-300) PER ATTACHED LEGALS AS REQUESTED BY EUGENE H. GYNNE JR.

WHEREAS, the City of Farmington, Arkansas amended its official zoning and zoning map by Ordinance 2011-02 on March 14, 2011, which was filed for record in the Office of the Circuit Clerk and Ex-Officio Recorder for Washington County, Arkansas in File 2011-00017652; and

WHEREAS, certain properties belonging to Eugene H. Gynne Jr. is zoned R-1; and

- From R-1, Residential Single Family, to MF-2, Multi-Family Residential, for the real properties described in Exhibit "A" which is attached hereto and made a part hereof.
- <u>Section 2.</u> That the official zoning map of the City of Farmington, Arkansas, is hereby amended to reflect the zoning change provided in section 1 above.
- <u>Section 3</u>. Emergency Clause. That the City Council of the City of Farmington, Arkansas further determines that this Ordinance is necessary to change the zoning for property within the City of Farmington; therefore an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

- The issue of Planning Area Boundary has come up again. "Planning area map" and "territorial jurisdiction" issues have come to the forefront with passage of Act 1053 of 2013. As a result of new territorial jurisdiction limits established by this Act, most cities will be required to revise their planning areas. According to A.C.A. 14-56-412, a planning commission must designate the area within the territorial jurisdiction for which it will prepare plans, and recommended ordinances and regulations. The area designated is known as the planning area. Generally speaking, the planning area is the area (within the territorial jurisdiction) that a city planning commission thinks is going to be "city" at some reasonable future date (typically, 20-25 years henceforth). It is within that area that studies are conducted, and for which plans are prepared. It also typically defines the external circumference of the jurisdictional area where subdivision regulations are enforced. The map, along with a description of the boundaries, should be confirmed by the city council, and must be filed with the city clerk and with the county recorder.

The new Act (which revised 14-56-413), reduced the territorial jurisdiction of cities under 60,000 population to one (1) mile beyond the corporate limits (and to 2 miles for cities between 60,000 – 150,000). It retained the equidistant provision: "If the territorial limits of two (2) or more municipalities' conflict, the limits of their respective territorial jurisdictions shall be a line equidistant between them, or as agreed on by the respective municipalities."

Now, as before, however, the planning area boundary <u>cannot</u> legally extend beyond the statutorily established territorial jurisdiction line. Given these new provisions, it is our hope that new planning area maps, without conflict between neighboring communities, can be established.

Once the planning commission comes up with a map the city council will have to approve it as well. You will have a map at your place that was proposed by regional planning. Let me know if you have questions.

- This is tall grass season. If you see a property that needs attention please let either Dan or me know. You may email us or call city hall and report it; we just need an address.
- If your constituents ask about the condition of ditches in front of their houses let them know that, as a general rule, it is the responsibility of the property owner to maintain ditches. July 2013 monthly report for Mayor and City Council

July was an above average month for calls for the Fire department because we had 63 calls for service and that is up a little, but normal for this month.

We have finished all the Hose testing, hydrant testing and maintenance, we have tested all the pumps on the fire trucks also we are ahead of where we should be and that's great.

Seems like they just turned off the water from the sky in this July and it became very dry, so we put on a Red Flag warning of high fire danger. This all came about after we started having brush fires and conditions were favorable for fires breaking out.

Because of the dry weather the flowers at the entrances of the city welcome signs were about to die and they had just planted some additional ones, we decided we needed to water them, so we went out and watered them and they are doing fine now.

I am asking that you approve a new firefighter (Brad Morgan) because we have a opening and I think he will be a good addition to the team.

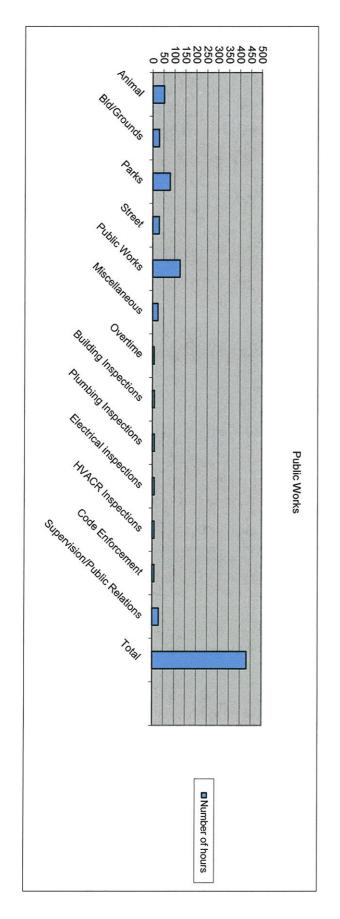
